

KEITH TAYLOR

KEITH TAYLOR began collecting caudiciform succulents in 1991 after seeing a large Cyphostemma Juttae in the ground at a local botanical garden. "I was drawn to size and grotesque shape of the trunk". The Cyphostemma he saw is also the 1st succulent he purchased. He has more than 800 plants in his collection. He grows in plastic pots and raised beds. Keith prefers his succulents to look like habitat specimens rather than cultivated plants. He grows them hard, meaning limited water, little to no feeding and hot sun to give them the look of collected plants.

In 2008, Keith began creating pots to show off his plants. He believes the pot should compliment the plant, not distract it. The main focus should be the succulent. If the pot is too ornate, colorful, or shiny, it draws your eye toward the pot rather than the succulent. Proportion also plays a role. Rocks and top dressing are also added to complete the presentation. His pottery is sought after by many Cacti & Succulent collectors, as well as bonsai artists.

Keith sells his work at Cacti & Succulent clubs and shows, bonsai clubs, online through Facebook, Instagram, and his website. He accepts custom orders and ships worldwide.

AUGUST PLANTILE MONTH

REBUTIA (INCLUDING SULCOREBUTIA & WEINGARTIA) BY KYLE WILLIAMS

Rebutia, Sulcorebutia, and Weingartia are South American cacti from the highlands of Bolivia and Northern Argentina. They are similar in appearance, in habitat and culture. Coming from high altitudes, they are both tolerant of cold, and if dry, can be left out in all weather. The populations of species of these genera overlap, but they do not naturally hybridize.

These genera are easily grown. They are dormant in winter, and start to grow in late March or April. They flower from April through June, with the peak flowering period varying from year to year depending on the weather. Two flowering cycles are common in cultivation in California. The flowers appear in abundance, and vary in color from purple and red through orange to yellow. They do well in standard cactus mix, and grow best with regular fertilization when in active growth. They are both attractive to spider mites. Damage can

be prevented by frequent inspection, and a weekly, forceful wash down with water. I have found mealybug infestations in S. rauschii to be particularly difficult to deal with because of the numerous densely packed

heads. Multiple applications of Imidacloprid (e.g. Bayer Tree and Shrub) over the course of six months were needed to eliminate my plant's infestation. Propagation from offsets is easy. The offsets should be cut off, left to dry for a few days, and then replanted. Very small offsets can be successfully rooted. Seed is easy to germinate, but is short lived.

Those of you who enjoy banging your head against a wall will enjoy learning about Rebutia, Sulcorebutia, and Weingartia taxonomy. It is one of the most complex taxonomic problems among cacti and has been argued over for years. Thankfully, DNA sequencing and phylogenetic systematics research is finally starting to make headway into the issue, though much is left to be done. This subject is far too complicated to get into detail here, but Sulcorebutia and Weingartia (as well as the monotypic Cintia knizei) should be lumped into a single genus, with Weingartia being the oldest name (and therefore the one that should be used).

Rebutia itself is distinct from these genera but has an even bigger problem, it contains two groups of species that are not closely related to each other (in scientific terms Rebutia is not monophyletic). One group of Rebutia is related to the Weingartia/Sulcorebutia group (but not part of it). This group includes R. padcayensis and R. miniscula. For nomenclatural reasons this is the group that would remain Rebutia. A second group of Rebutia including R. pseudodeminuta, R. fiebrigii, R. deminuta, R. pygmaea, R. steinmannii and R. einsteinii is distinct evolutionarily from the first group and will be considered a different genus. This group will require a new name for the genus. It should be noted that there are clear morphological differences that separate these groups, so it isn't just DNA that "says" they are different!

Just to summarize: Rebutia will become two genera and Sulcorebutia, Weingartia, and Cintia will be lumped into a single genus.

Commiphora are members of the Burseraceae, a mid-sized family of woody shrubs and trees found throughout the warm deserts and tropical regions of the world. Common traits found in most or all of the Burseraceae are woody habit, peeling bark, and most notably strongly scented resins or essential. There are approximately 19 genera and 700+ species in the family. Most interesting to cacti and succulent collectors are the genera Bursera, Boswellia (Frankincense), and today's subject, Commiphora. It should be noted that the very similar Operculicarya belongs to a different, but closely related, family Anacardiaceae.

Commiphora are found primarily in arid regions of Africa through the Middle East to India and Sri Lanka, east to Vietnam. A single species is native to Brazil as well. Most of the diversity is in continental Africa and Madagas-car. It can be distinguished from the very similarand better known Bursera by details of the flower buds and that Commiphora is usually spiny while Bursera is usually spineless. By contrast, Bursera are confined to the New World, mostly from Southern California through Guatemala. There are nearly 200 species of Commiphora making it the largest genus in the family.

Commiphora have similar cultivation requirements to Bursera. They all do best when watered in the summer in Southern California. They will all tolerate being left unprotected, outdoors during the winter rains, although some of the Commiphora are more sensitive to freezing temperatures, and need protection when freezes occur. Any standard succulent mix will do as a potting medium. Growth is

much more rapid when they are fed. If grown in an open mix they an take an amazing amount of water in

the summer, and will reward the grower with sub-stantial growth and trunk thickening. All of the plants do well when treated as bonsai, and pruned to expose the geometry and structure of the trunk and bark. Planting in the ground will greatly accelerate the growth rate. It should be noted that this refers to the caudiciform species from arid regions that you'll normally find cultivated by cacti and succulent growers. The tropical tree species would have different requirements.

Commiphora have been renowned for their resins and essential oils since at least Biblical times. You may re-member that in the nativity story the three wise mean brought the baby Jesus gold, Frankincense, and Myrrh. Myrrh is the resin of Commiphora myrrha while Frankincense is the resin of fellow Burseraceae member Boswellia sacra.

Weird weather. It certainly is difficult to know how to take care of your plants when one day it is cool and partly cloudy and the next day the wind is blowing, humidity is in the low teens and it is ninety degrees. Here in the mountains temperatures are still falling down into the low 60s at night and this morning at 5AM it was only 59 degrees; it should be at least ten degrees warmer. We have seen nearly every bit of strange weather this year and it's a continuing problem.

All I can recommend is vigilance; you are going to have to pay serious attention when you are out inspecting your plants.

When it's really hot; although we haven't exactly seen much of that yet; most of our cacti and succulents shut down and don't require a lot of water. I have yet to hit 120 degrees in the greenhouse, its mid-July and a lot of my plants are still actively growing. The Haworthias and Gasterias continue to throw up flowers when they should be shutting down for the summer. Even a few of my shrubby Aizoaceae are flowering as if it is still spring. And as long as that's happening I am watering them on a weekly basis.

If we swing back into full summer; and the temperatures climb up at night into the 70s; I'll extend out my watering to every ten to twelve days. The plants need just enough water to keep all those little root hairs alive. Watering in a hot summer is much like watering in deep winter; you don't want the soil in the pots to go dust dry or you'll lose the feeder roots. Then when the temperatures drops, it cools off and you resume weekly watering you run the risk of rotting out any plant that has lost those roots.

And take heed; there are some websites that will caution you not to water your cactus or succulents until they have completely dried out; thereby killing those oh, so necessary root hairs. When I had only a few plants, I could check the moisture by walking around to every plant and sticking my finger in an inch or so, or picking up the plant to see how light it is, indicating dry soil. Now I've learned that just by looking you can tell if they need more water. If it's a cactus it will lose a little of the body shine. If it's a succulent the leaves will droop just a little bit. Then you need to check the soil, if it's dry, give it water, but only after you have checked.

I know we want to take good care of our plants and treat them right, but more plants have died of being drowned by an overly solicitous owner than have died of thirst; especially our beloved cactus and succulents.

Benign neglect. Focus on those words and you should do fine.

In advance, thank you for all you do to make the club as successful as it is!



Education is a key component of the Inter-City Show. The numerous walk and talks allow visitors to learn something new about cultivation. These intimate gatherings afford attendees the opportunity to ask questions from experts in a variety of succulent fields, learning things you can't find in a book or by browsing the Internet.

But one of the most enjoyable aspects is meeting new people who share the same interests as you. Pick the strangest succulent passion out there, and you'll find someone else that shares it. Over the three decades of our show, countless friendships have sprung up between attendees. Plant material swapped, information exchanged, and new seeds planted. WEAR YOUR CLUB BADGES!

A good crowd in the room makes for a better show. This is a great time to meet people from the other clubs and to spend more quality time with the plants you love. SHIRTS AND ARTWORK


This year's T-Shirt design is Orbea namaquensis by Tom Glavich. Do you have this plant? It would be interesting to see a great display of this wonderful plant.

- Awards and exhibits must remain until the end of the show, 5:00PM Sunday August 11, 2019.
- All judge's decisions are final & the show committee decisions are final.
- The three host clubs & the show committee will not assume responsibility for the loss or injury of property.
- The show committee reserves the right to move or adjust plants, categories or displays to improve or facilitate a better show.
- All commercial growers or vendors in the Inter-City Show must either enter a display or enter a minimum of 10 plants in the Open class.
- Inch measurements as indicated in the show categories refer to the inside diameter of the pot.
- Plants with 30% or more Variegation, Crest or Monstrose may only appear in such categories except for variegation in Gasteria & Sansevieria.
- A Rookie novice is one who has not shown more than 10 plants cumulative.
- Plant stands may only be used in the Bonsai class or with plants that cascade below the bottom edge of the pot.
- For odd-shaped pots, size is determined by adding the length & width together & dividing by two.
