September Guest Speaker John Matthews A Survey of the Genus Haworthia

I will start with a very brief summary of the Haworthia history and some of the important people involved with this succulent. Next we will discuss some individual plants that are a part of my extensive collection and have an opportunity to closely scrutinize these specimen. We should have plenty of time to answer questions about the culture of this genus and how to care for them. This discussion is strictly hands-on; no slides or computer presentation. Although I have never been to South Africa or received a formal education in the botanical sciences, I have a passion for the genus Haworthia.

I have collected Haworthias off and on for 35 years beginning in the early 1970's and was a member of the Sunset Succulent Society for 5 or 6 years. I dropped out of the hobby when I moved to a condominium and had to get rid of all my plants. In 2002 I rediscovered the Sunset Club and renewed my fascination with these succulents. I rejoined the Sunset club, then the Los Angeles club, then the San Gabriel Club, and then the Long Beach club where I am the newsletter editor. I also volunteer at The Huntington Gardens where I am responsible for the care and propagation of the Haworthia collection



Intercity Show

I want to thank all the LACSS members who participated in the 25th annual Inter-City Show and Sale this year either as an exhibitor or by helping out during the show/sale or in setup or teardown. There were 1,392 entries in the show with a total of 1,450 plants displayed. The ratio of cacti entries (over 700) to succulent entries(over 600) is welcome after years in which succulents outnumbered cacti 2 to 1. PLANTS FOR THE YEAR 2010 LOS ANGELES CACTUS AND SUCCULENT SOCIETY (LACSS)

Entry Classes: All new members, new to the hobby, should enter plants in the Novice class. Novices must move to the Advanced class after they have won a total of 40 first place awards in the Plant of the Month competition. Individuals who own a nursery are required to enter in the Open class. Although it is not advised, LACSS members are free to enter a plant in the Open class at any time.

Prizes: All prizes are awarded at the Holiday Celebration in December. Trophies are awarded by entry class for those members who scored the most points in either the cacti or combined succulent categories. In the Novice and Advanced classes the top three scorers in each of the plant categories will also receive a prize (typically a plant). These prizes are awarded based on the total number of points scored during the year. Finally, a trophy is awarded to members, regardless of class, who have earned the most points in the cactus or two succulent categories during the prior year.

Entry Requirements: All entrants must be LACSS members. Members are restricted to 3 plants per entry category per month - a total of 6 plants. In the Advanced and Open Classes, members must have been in possession of their plants for at least one year. Those members showing in the Novice class may immediately enter a recently obtained plant. You can only enter plants that conform to the Plant of the Month schedule described above.

Plants that are in flower and the rarity of the entry are two additional criteria judges employ in determining monthly winners

Los Angeles Cactus and Succulent Society Cactus and Succulent of the Month September 2010 - *Miniatures*



Mammillaria hernandezii

The term "miniature" does not have a precise botanical meaning. It is connected to the hobby and the showing of plants at different venues. In these shows there is typically a category of plant referred to as Miniatures, specifically designating that this entries must be shown in pots that are no more that 3 inches in diameter.

There are in fact a fair number cactus and succulents whose growth patterns are small and never grow to sizes that exceed the show restriction. Therefore there are two types of plants that meet the show criteria depending on the show rules. In one case you have juvenile plants that have been place in pots in order to meet the standard stated above. In this instance the "miniature" when repotted may grow to a much larger size. In the second case you have plants that are truly diminutive by nature and will retain their small size as they mature.

In this article a few examples of cacti and succulent species will be presented that will retain their smaller forms even as they mature. Despite their diminutive size, these plants can be stunning and will enthrall those who view them.

Examples of small cacti include Mammillaria hernandezii, Echinocereus davisii, and ,although it can form sizeable clumps when mature, Rebutia heliosa.

Examples of smaller succulents include lithops, conophytums, and some species of haworthias.
